ABOUT PATKAI CHRISTIAN COLLEGE (PCC)

THE COLLEGE

Patkai Christian College is a liberal arts college founded and established on 28th August, in 1974 to provide subjects of study that develop students' knowledge and ability to think. Patkai was born out of the prayers of Christians in Nagaland and Manipur, and overseas, of which the Nagaland Baptist Church Council and Manipur Baptist Convention are major sponsors. However the college is not a denominational institution. Hence the college received financial assistance from several christian denominational churches as well as independent churches and organizations.

Patkai, as a Christian college firmly believes that education is for the whole man within the framework of spiritual and moral absolutes. Like every christian college, Patkai has the difficult task of retaining its traditional stance while seeking to make its educational philosophy relevant to the world around it. Committed to the principle that the truth is revealed by God through Christ "...in Whom are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge" (Col. 2:3), Patkai will seek to relate its instruction to the needs of contemporary society. The college will consciously seek to place all its activities within the framework of biblical perspective, specially on such critical issues as the nature of God, man, nature and the world, and to relate its instruction to the needs of the present society.

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The central purpose of the college is expressed in its motto: "Lux et Veritas," Light and Truth. This purpose produces a concern for truth, righteousness and beauty and thereby gives meaning to the ideal of a christian liberal arts college. The founders of the college maintain that academic excellence and biblical christian faith and practice are essential to that purpose. Patkai consciously seeks to aid the students in developing habits which will contribute to his well-being - physical, psychological and spiritual - and which will enable them to participate constructively in community and church life.

LOCATION

Patkai's 1000 acre site was donated by Chümoukedima and Seithekema villages. It is a mega campus residential college located across the Chathe river, 10 miles east of Dimapur on the way to Kohima. It is 10 miles from the only railway station, and seven miles from the only airport in Nagaland. The campus is hardly two furlongs from the National Highway (NH) 29, and another four-lane NH, which is connected to neighbouring Assam state, passes through the college campus.

It is an Annual Academic Excellence Award instituted in the year 2023 by the children of Dr. Satuo Sekhose in memory of their father's close association with the college. The Awardee shall be presented with a Certificate of Excellence and an amount of Rs. 30,000 (thirty thousand) signed by the Principal and any one descendant of Late Dr. Satuo Sekhose.



INFRASTRUCTURE AT PCC

AUDITORIUM

Bundrock Chapel/ Auditorium has a seating capacity of 1500. The auditorium is well equipped with lighting and sound system. All important functions of the college are organized in the auditorium.

BANKING FACILITY - ATM

Axis Bank ATM facility is made available 24×7 to the students and residents of the campus.

CAFETERIA AND CONVENIENCE PROVISION STORE

The college has two cafeteria- one in Old Campus, constructed by Chümoukedima Thepfü Thepfü Krotho run and managed by a third party. The cafeteria at New Campus is run and managed by the Alumni Association, PCC. Both the cafeteria provide service to cater to the needs of the students, staff and faculty. A Convenience Provision store at Old Campus caters to the needs of the residents of Patkai Christian College. Cafeterias at both the campuses provide healthy snacks, meals and beverages to PCC.

CLASSROOMS

The classrooms are equipped with Wifi connectivity, proper lighting, well ventilated, 24x7 power backup smart classrooms with LCD Projection facility.

LABORATORIES

All the 6 (six) science departments have adequate functional laboratories. The laboratories are being equipped with sophisticated instruments to enable the students to carry out practical not only at UG & PG level but also for advanced level of experimental work.

LAVATORIES

Clean, well-maintained and separate lavatories for males and females with adequate water supply, wash basins and mirrors.

LIBRARY

The library is a knowledge hub with a rich and ever-growing collection of over 25000 books in the field of Commerce, Management, Statistics, Mathematics, Economics, Humanities, Social Science, Sciences, natural sciences and literature to provide a wide range of academic resources to students and faculty members. It has two large reading halls which provide peaceful ambience to the students and faculty. The library has subscribed to various newspapers, magazines, national and international journals for its readers. The library collection can be searched in OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue).

PARKING FACILITY

With 1000 acres of land, the college has good parking facility for both the students and staffs. Well constructed Parking facility at New Campus Administrative Block for two wheelers and fours wheelers is made available for the Patkaians.





PRIMARY HEALTH CENTRE

First aid and ambulance services are made available on round the clock basis. A special scheme known as Social Security Scheme is in place for students and employees in case of sickness leading to hospitalization, operation or death while studying or working in the college.

RESIDENCE FACILITY

Patkai Christian College, a residential college provides 90% residence facility for students and staff. At the old Campus, the college has four (4) boys and six (6) girls hostel for both undergraduate and postgraduate students. The hostels at New Campus accommodates all undergraduate students of Science disciplines.

SEMINAR/CONFERENCE HALL

Seminar/Conference hall with well equipped LCD Projection facility with a seating capacity of about 100 students. Science Seminar Hall in Science Complex with well equipped LCD Projection facility and with a seating Capacity of 100 students.

SPIRITUAL MINISTRY

The Spiritual Ministry of the college consists of the College Community, the Nagamese Fellowship, the Sunday School, the Evangelical Union of the Undergraduate, the Evangelical Union of the Postgraduate, and the Evangelical Graduate Fellowship. The EUs and the EGF are part and parcel of the Union of Evangelical Students of India (UESI). Sunday Morning Worship Service, Passion Week and Community Retreat programmes are included in the responsibility of the Chaplain. The Spiritual Committee is manned by the Chaplain (Chairman), the presidents of the EU and the EGF, the Superintendent of the Sunday School, the Faculty/staff-incharge of the Nagamese Fellowship, the Bible Teacher (Secretary), and the president of the EGF. One more person may be opted by the Chairman, if necessary. The Nagamese Fellowship is for members who converse in languages other than English.

SPORTS

For all round and wholesome education of the students, the college provides sports facility comprising outdoor sports field like Football Ground, Volley Ball and Basket Court. Indoor Stadium is for badminton, table tennis and recreational activities for students and for the Patkai Faculty Badminton Club.

TRANSPORTATION

With a good number of vehicles at the disposal of the college, the students, staff and faculty are provided transportation facility to and from the college at regular intervals. The college also provides vehicles to students, staff and faculty on priority basis for official and other purposes.





UGC RESOURCE CENTRE/ COMPUTER CENTRE

The college has a well equipped internet resource centre with 44 desktops. Students from different disciplines use the resource centre at access digital resources for academic purposes. The centre serves as a lab for students in preparing their projects and practical classes for few disciplines of Sciences, Commerce, Economics and Mass Communication. The resource centre is well-equipped with updated software and hardware along with high-speed internet connectivity and uninterrupted power backup.



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INTRODUCTION TO NATIONAL EDUCATION POLICY (NEP) 2020 From the 2024-25 Academic Year

The Government of India announced the National Education Policy-2020 in July 2020. Covering all levels of education – from school education to higher education, including professional and adult education – the policy rests on the principles of affordability, accessibility, quality, equity, and accountability. A substantial part of the policy document is devoted to higher education, with emphasis on a multidisciplinary approach, faculty, and institutional autonomy, governance reforms, enhancing access through credit mobility, open and digital learning environment, and skills development.

In adherence to the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, Patkai Christian College is introducing a revised Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (CCFUP). This is based on the University Grants Commission's (UGC) guidelines, with a student-centric focus, flexible choice-based credit system, and a multidisciplinary approach. This framework also provides multiple entry and exit options, facilitating students to align their education with their career aspirations by choosing subjects/ fields of their interest.

NATIONAL CADET CORPS (NCC)

The NCC as an elective subject offers the students a package of selected subjects and disciplines, which are essential for the overall development of a person's character, personality and wellbeing in today's highly competitive world. Apart from imparting basic military trainings, the course offers several other disciplines such as personality development, leadership training, social service, disaster management, health and hygiene, life skills, adventure trainings, environmental awareness and human rights education. The department aims to produce technically trained and knowledgeable manpower in the field with interest and potential in scientific skills, thinking, communication, analytical writing, designing possible remedies and generating data base on local and national environmental issues that may have global significance.

The entire course curriculum is designed keeping in mind the need to create a human resource of highly organised, trained, disciplined and motivated youth, to provide leadership in all walks of life and always be available for the service of the society and nation at large.

'B' & 'C' certificate: After completion of 2 years and at least 1 camp cadet can appear for 'B' Certificate Examination and after completion of 3 years and at least 2 camps cadet can appear for 'C' Certificate Examination.

NCC is offered as an elective subject with 12 credit hours spread over 6 semesters and is open to all streams of undergraduate programmes.

CERTIFICATE COURSES

Certificate Course in Counselling offered by the department of Bible is for the U.G. students who are enrolled in the third semester. This is a practical and stimulating course introducing and preparing the students to understand the fundamentals of counselling, the modes of operation and how these tools can be applied in addressing the myriad social problems being faced in the society. The other details pertaining to this course may be had from the department. The entire course curriculum is designed keeping in mind the need to create a human resource of highly organised, trained, disciplined and motivated youth, to provide leadership in all walks of life and always be available for the service of the society and nation at large.

Certificate in Applied Electronics and Computer Hardware

In the last few years, the use of electrical and electronic gadgets has increased tremendously. These gadgets are used for personal purpose or in educational and professional field. With this, the need for trained personnel for maintenance and repair of the gadgets has also increased.

The main objective of this course is to train the student in applied field of electronics and computer hardware along with undergraduate study. This course will train the students on how to install and manage household electrical wiring, basics of electronics such as amplifiers, battery chargers, inverters, computer hardware etc. Repairing of electronic devices used in scientific laboratories is also included in the course. The course is very potent for self-employment, employment in electrical and electronic farms, computer hardware as well as for personal purpose. The other details pertaining to this course may be had from the department.

Photography & Visual Communication

The objective of the course is to educate still photography practitioners within a larger framework of imaging studies, visual culture and new digital technologies. Students are exposed to different kinds of photography practices such as micro photography, street photography, photojournalism, advertising photography, industrial photography, science, lifestyle, documentary and research based photography.

Course Inputs:

The course is for 3 months duration and includes class-room theoretical sessions and hands on learning. The time given for the practical will be half of the duration of the course.



ASSOCIATION/CLUB/CELLS OF THE COLLEGE

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

ADMISSION GUIDELINES

ADMISSION PROCEDURE

- Application for admission to Patkai Christian College will be done offline mode by issue of Application Forms from the college "Accounts Section" as well as online from the college website (www.patkaicollege.edu.in)
- Applicants can choose Generic course from the options provided from each programs offered.
- Selection for admission will be based entirely on merit basis.
- Admission of Open Merit Category
- (i) 50% of the seats, discipline wise shall be earmarked to be filled up by Open Merit Category Candidates.
- (ii) From out of this 50% seats, reservation in favour of Scheduled tribes would be 12% and Scheduled caste 5%. This reservation would be discipline wise.
- (iii) Admission for each discipline shall be based on Open Merit Basis

RESERVATION POLICY

General Reservation

- 50% of the total admission will be allocated as open for all categories of the candidates across the country.
- The remaining 50 % will be reserved for candidates from Nagaland and Manipur.

Special Reservation

- Persons with Benchmark Disabilities: 5% of the sanctioned seats shall be reserved horizontally, across all categories, for the PwBD candidates with 50% reservation in favour of Christian candidates.
- Children of Martyrs: Three candidates who are children of defence personnel who have lost their lives in the line of duty will be allotted seats across all disciplines. Merit will be determined as in the Open Merit Category
- Sports category: Admissions from sports category shall be 5% of the sanctioned number of seats. A Committee chaired by the Principal shall oversee and organise admissions to this category. The selection procedure shall comprise
 - a. Sports Trials
 - b. Sports Certificates

GENERAL RULES/STANDARDS

Rules are intended to regulate, transform and develop the lives of those to whom they are applied.

1. BEHAVIOURAL STANDARDS

Although no statement of the expectations for a community like Patkai will be satisfactory to everyone, the demands of community life require some mutual understanding about acceptable conduct. The following standards apply to all members of the community:

- 1.1 Practices such as fornication, adultery, homosexuality, drunkenness, theft, profanity, dishonesty and gambling which are forbidden in the Scripture will not be condoned at Patkai.
- 1.2 Knowing the danger to one's health in the use of tobacco products, hard drugs (including opium, ganja and marijuana) and alcoholic beverages, no member of the community will be excused for the use of such substances.
- 1.3 Students are not allowed to organize any meetings of or paste any notice on college Notice Board or anywhere within the campus without written permission of the Principal.
- 1.4 Active participation in politics is not compatible with academic life and as such students will not be allowed to indulge in public activities which are of political in nature, particularly on the campus.
- 1.5 Students are not allowed to lodge complaints through unauthorised association/body (representation or memorandum). Instead they shall be expected to present their demand/opinion to the authority through proper channel (through their college-authorised representatives).
- 1.6 Other specific rules and regulations for orderly community life may be established for effective management of facilities such as library, hostels, etc.
- 1.7 Any deviation from standard behaviour by a Patkai community member will invite punishment as per rules and/or decision of the Disciplinary Committee.

2. DISCIPLINE

- 2.1 The Dean of Students is empowered to deal with student misconduct cases.
- 2.2 It is the administrative responsibility of the Dean of Students to deal with all cases of student's misconduct in and around the hostels.
- 2.3 Matter concerning expulsion of student(s) from the college will be jointly decided by the Dean of student, the Vice-Principal and the concerned Academic Dean.

3. GROUNDS FOR EXPELLING STUDENTS FROM COLLEGE:

- 3.1 Sexual immorality
- 3.2 Assault/threat on the college employees
- 3.3 Gambling with money (any game)
- 3.4 Stealing/theft
- 3.5 Use of hard drugs (including opium, ganja, marijuana, etc.)
- 3.6 Indifference to warnings
- 3.7 Use of alcoholic beverages/intoxicating drinks, sniffing dendrite, etc.
- 3.8 Destruction of college property
- 3.9 Keeping fire-arms/lethal weapons
- 3.10 Any other serious offence deserving expulsion

4. GROUNDS FOR NOT PERMITTING STUDENTS TO RETURN FOR THE NEXT SEMESTER/YEAR:

- 4.1 Negligence of attending classes, chapel, worship services and college functions
- 4.2 Avoidance of tests, exams and assignments
- 4.3 Being rowdy and unruly in class, hostel, office, dining-kitchen etc.
- 4.4 Political activism
- 4.5 Disturbing the peace on campus and study hours
- 4.6 Immoral intimate relationships
- 4.7 Bad influence on others
- 4.8 Non-cooperation with faculty and staff
- 4.9 Smoking, playing cards, cheating, lying, forgery, etc.
- 4.10 Any other serious offence deserving expulsion (as may be decided by concerned committee/ authority)

ANTI-RAGGING

The College upholds the University Grants Commission (UGC) Regulations on Curbing the Meance of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009. (Under Section 26 (1) (g) of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956)

In exercise of the powers conferred by clause (g) of sub-section (1) of section 26 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956, the University Grant Commission hereby makes the following Regulations, namely —

What constitutes Ragging?

- a. Ragging constitutes one or more of any of the following acts: a. any conduct by any student or students whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student;
- b. Indulging in rowdy or indisciplined activities by any student or students which cause or likely to cause annoyance, hardship, physical or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any other student;
- c. Asking any student to do any act which such student will not in the ordinary course do and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame, or torment or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of such fresher or any other student;
- d. Any act by a senior student that prevents, disrupts or disturbs the regular academic activity of any other student or a fresher,
- e. Exploiting the services of a fresher or any other student for completing the academic tasks assigned to an individual or a group of students.
- f. Any act of financial extortion or forceful expenditure burden put on a fresher or any other student by students;
- g. Any act of physical abuse including all variants of it: sexual abuse, homosexual assaults, stripping, forcing obscene and lewd acts, gestures, causing bodily harm or any other danger to health or person;
- h. Any act or abuse by spoken words, emails, post, public insults which would also include deriving perverted pleasure, vicarious or sadistic thrill from actively or passively participating in the discomfiture to fresher or any other student;
- i. Any act that affects the mental health and self-confidence of a fresher or any other student with or without an intent to derive a sadistic pleasure or showing off power, authority or superiority by a student over any fresher or any other student.

Administrative action in the event of Ragging:

The institution shall punish a student found guilty of ragging after following the procedure and in the manner prescribed herein under:

- a. The Anti-Ragging committee of the institution shall take an appropriate decision, in regard to punishment or otherwise, depending on the facts of each incident of ragging and nature and gravity of the incident of ragging established in the recommendations of the Anti-Ragging Squad.
- b. The Anti-Ragging Committee may, depending on the nature and gravity of the guilt established by the Anti-Ragging Squad, award, to those found guilty, one or more of the following punishments, namely:
 i. Suspension from attending classes and academic privileges.
 - ii. Withholding / withdrawing scholarships / fellowship and other benefits.
 - iii. Debarring from appearing in any test / Examination or other evaluation process.
 - iv. Withholding results.
 - v. Debarring from representing the institution in any Regional, National or International meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.
 - vi. Suspension / expulsion from the hostel.

- vii. Cancellation of admission
- viii. Rustication from the institution for a period ranging from 1 to 4 semesters.
- ix. Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution for a specified period.
- x. Fine which may extend up to 2.5 lakhs. Provided that where the person committing or abetting the act of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment.
- c. An appeal against the order of punishment by the Anti-Ragging Committee shall lie;
 - i. In case of an order of an institution, affiliated to or constituent part, of a University to the Vice-Chancellor of the University;
 - ii. In case of an order of a University, to its Chancellor.
 - iii. In case of an institution of national importance created by an Act of Parliament, to the Chairman or Chancellor of the institution, as the case may be.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT

UGC (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal of sexual Harassment of women Employees and Students in Higher Educational Institution) Regulation, 2015 defines "sexual harassment" as "An unwanted conduct with sexual undertones if it occurs or which is persistent and which demeans, humiliates or creates a hostile and intimidating environment or is calculated to induce submission by actual or threatened adverse consequences and includes any one or more or all of the following unwelcome acts or behaviour (Whether directly or by implication) namely:

- (a) any unwelcome physical, verbal or non-verbal conduct of sexual nature;
- (b) demand or request for sexual favours;
- (c) making sexually coloured remarks
- (d) physical contact and advances or
- (e) Showing pornography

Sexual harassment in the college is a legal crime and the penalty for a perpetrator student is expulsion.

ADMISSION FEES:

- It includes all the non-refundable fees and three months tuition fees. Hosteller includes admission, 3 months Electricity and Room rent at the time of Admission.
- Social Security @ Rs. 100 is taken in every one academic year and this is already included in the 1st Installment. This amount covers the students for any eventuality while studying here. A student may receive Rs. 10,000 for accidental case if his/her treatment goes beyond Rs. 10,000, and Rs. 15,000 in case of death.
- Security Deposit of Rs. 3,000/- one time payment is to be paid at the Admission which is refundable on graduation or leaving the college.
- Uniform fees payable separately.
- Mess fees payable separately on monthly basis.

N.B: Fees once paid will not be refunded after the commencement of class which is more than 15 days except in case of Health issue. Refund of fees shall be made leaving aside the annual fees in case of admission withdrawal before the commencement of class. 50% of the refundable fees shall be granted within 15 days of Commencement of Classes. The college and hostel fees for the Semester must be paid in full in the event of expulsion or cessation of studies apart from Health Issue.

HOSTEL FEES FOR UG & PG:

Hostel Fee payable at the time of Admission Rs. 7500

- Monthly Mess fee Rs. 2300/- per month shall be paid within 15 day of every month. Late payment will
 incur a late fine of Rs. 20/- per day. Mess fee for the academic session need to be cleared irrespective of
 whether he/she eats in the mess or not. In-case of any health issue they shall be exempted from paying
 mess fee on producing medical certificate.
- In-case situations arise where the college working day ends by the 15th of a month then 50% of the monthly mess Fee need to be paid. Any Hosteller staying beyond the 15th of a month will have to pay the mess fees in full.
- Late arrival after the hostel and college reopens does not allow any reduction in the monthly hostel fee since it is solely based on the working days of the college and every hosteller is expected to be in the hostel from the time that the hostel re-opens. In case of any reduction in mess fee due to cancellation of classes then the discounted mess fee will be communicated to all the students.
- Mess fees shall increase by Rs. 100/- every academic year which is liable to increase further without prior information if situation arises.

FEES PAYMENT MODE NEW ACADEMIC SESSION 2024-25

All payments/transactions should be made/verified in the accounts section of the college from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm. On Saturdays, fees can be paid from 9:00am till 11:00am. Fees shall not be accepted after the stipulated mentioned given time.

Payments may be made through the following methods:

- 2. Payments are to be made on the college online portal. Each student will be provided with a unique ID for access to the portal.
- 3. Through swiping machine with Debit or Credit card at the office with a charges of 1% on the transaction amount. The charges need to be paid in cash.
- 4. Cheque/Demand draft in favor of "Patkai Christian College".

N.B: Installment payment after the above given date shall attract a fine of Rs. 100/- for every 15 days late. Non payment of Installment and Mess fees within 30 days may lead to deregistration.

FEE PAYMENT INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Admission is semester-wise (six monthly).
- 2. Tuition fee and room rent may be paid either in full (for six months) at the time of admission or in two equal installments, the first installment (3 months) at admission time and the second installment (3 months) prior to the issue of Admit card.
- 3. All other fees are to be paid in full at admission time.
- 4. The first month's mess fee (say July/August) will be paid at admission time. Payment of mess fee for subsequent months is on monthly basis. Mess fee is subject to change any time without prior notice in case of price rise in markets.
- 5. Each month's mess fee must be paid during the current month failing which a fine of one rupee per day will be charged with effect from the first day of the following month.
- 6. Any person permitted to stay in hostel and joins the mess for a short time will pay Rs. 1500/- per month as room rent and Rs. 200/- per day as mess fee.
- 7. Dues, if any, must be cleared prior to the issue of Admit Card for End Semester Examination (Odd/ Even) failing which defaulters will not be issued Admit Card.

Refunding Rules

- 1. Admission once taken, non-refundable (NR) fees will not be entertained.
- 2. Cancellation/withdrawal of admission on or before class commencement will get a refund of all other fees in full except the non-refundable fees.
- 3. Cancellation/withdrawal of admission within 15 days of class commencement will get a refund of 50% of all other fees except the non-refundable fees.
- 4. For cancellation/withdrawal of admission beyond 15 days of class commencement there will be no refund whatsoever.
- 5. If any student vacates the hostel seat in the middle of the semester, the full semester dues should be paid at the time of hostel seat clearance except for mess fees.

Rules for refund of Mess Fee

- 1. There will be no refund/exemption of mess fee for late arrival in the hostel. But if late arrival is due to own sickness, roadblock, bandh, death in the family the same may be reported to the principal in writing.
- 2. Mess fee exemption/refunding may be applied through the Dean of Students if absence is due to one of the following reasons
 - a) Training camps, events or programmes permitted by the college.
 - b) Case of sickness supported by medical prescription.


