15.Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Multidisciplinary and Clusters Approach Patkai Christian College, as a liberal arts institution, is deeply committed to holistic education that addresses the intellectual, physical, spiritual, and moral dimensions of its students. Since its founding, the College has embraced a multidisciplinary framework, aligning its educational philosophy with this comprehensive view of personal and academic growth. While the term "clusters" has recently gained prominence in academic discourse, Patkai's approach reflects these principles, positioning the institution in harmony with the vision outlined in the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. The College offers undergraduate degree programmes in 15 disciplines across the faculties of Arts, Commerce, Music, Science, and Computer Applications. Additionally, as a Postgraduate College accredited by the UGC since 2011, Patkai offers advanced degree programmes in English, Political Science, Botany, Environmental Science, Geology, Physics, and Zoology. Interdisciplinary Approach Patkai Christian College attained autonomous status in 2005 and adopted the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in 2016, reflecting its commitment to evolving with the national and global academic landscape. The College has consistently strived to foster interdisciplinary learning, particularly since the introduction of CBCS. As part of this effort, Generic Elective Courses (GEC) at the undergraduate level are available to students across all disciplines. Initially, only GECs from the Arts and Mathematics streams were open for cross-disciplinary selection. However, in preparation for the broader adoption of the NEP 2020 guidelines, since 2021, all GECs have been made available to students from every discipline. Currently, the College is actively working towards integrating interdisciplinary approaches into its postgraduate programmes, further enhancing academic quality and breadth.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Patkai Christian College has successfully registered with the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) under the National Academic Depository (NAD). To facilitate seamless student mobility across institutions within the state and across the country, the College is currently establishing a formal system for credit recognition, accumulation, and transfer. The College will initiate the existing ERP software to be aligned with the guidelines of the UGC, ABC, and NAD to ensure efficient management of credit accumulation and transfer. Additionally, the College will initiate the process of revising course and paper codes to meet the specific requirements of the Academic Bank of Credits

framework.

17.Skill development:

Patkai Christian College offers a wide range of initiatives focused on skill development, including programmes in soft skills such as communication and academic writing. Additionally, value-added courses, as well as courses on employability and entrepreneurial skills, are integrated into the curriculum. In line with the requirements of the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS), all departments offer two Skill Enhancement Courses each. The College's Music School/Department takes pride in its state-of-the-art music education, which has nurtured celebrated musicians both within the state and beyond, attracting students and faculty from across the country and internationally. The Department of Music has successfully trained self-employed musicians who are vital to the music industry in Nagaland and beyond. Similarly, the Department of Mass Communication has consistently brought accolades to the College, excelling in various areas of the field. Patkai is also one of the select educational institutions approved by Bosch India Limited. A faculty member of the College is a certified trainer under the Industry-Academia Collaboration Coordinator (IACC) programme, aligned with the Youth Employability Skills (YES) in Higher Education initiative, which is in accordance with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. Through this initiative, the trainer has gained the technical expertise to provide skill entrepreneurship training to students. In its ongoing efforts to implement the NEP, the College is in the process of signing Memoranda of Understanding (MOUs) with several skill centres within the state. These collaborations will cover key areas such as carpentry, electrical fittings, cutting and tailoring, hospitality, aviation, and the cruise line industry. Additionally, the College has staff and faculty members with certified expertise in these fields, who have previously provided training to students through the Kaushal schemes. With access to rich natural and acquired resources, Patkai Christian College is well-positioned to offer comprehensive skill education to both its students and the wider community.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The curriculum at Patkai Christian College is deeply integrated with the Indian knowledge system. Courses such as Indian History, Public Policy, Indian Administration, India's Foreign Policy, Indian Economy, Indian Philosophy, Environmental Economics, Environmental Philosophy, Industrial Chemicals and the

Environment, Green Chemistry, Earth and Climate, Environmental Geology, Wildlife Conservation and Management, and Principles of Ecology, among others, address issues of national importance and promote national integration. Furthermore, the curriculum includes a wide range of courses centered on human values, such as Guidance and Counselling, Value and Peace Education, Special Education, Ethics, Philosophy of Religion, Philosophy of Culture, Philosophy of Mahatma Gandhi, Philosophy of Mind, Philosophy of Human Rights, Peace and Conflict Resolution, Human Rights in Comparative Perspectives, and Media Laws and Ethics. In the area of Indian language education, the College is exploring a partnership with some prestigious institution under the University of Delhi, with the College already establishing a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Laxmibhai College, Delhi.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The syllabus at Patkai Christian College was revised and approved during the 13th Academic Council meeting in September 2022, marking the introduction of the Outcome-Based Education (OBE) model for both teaching and assessment across all academic programmes. Patkai Christian College places significant emphasis on OBE. While many higher education institutions (HEIs) globally face challenges in meeting educational goals, the College has consistently fulfilled its mission, as reflected in its vision of shaping students into 'wholesome individuals.' The student-centric teaching and learning approach, which was already strengthened by the adoption of the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) and praxis-oriented education, is further enhanced through OBE practices. The implementation of OBE at the College is facilitated through the following practices: The College offers 158 courses focused on employability and entrepreneurship enrichment, supported by a commendable number of value-added programmes, free coaching for competitive examinations, and career counseling. Skill Enhancement Courses provide students with hands-on experience and training, equipping them with problem-solving methodologies. Academic departments organize regular field projects, industrial visits, and exposure trips. Class seminars, presentations, skits, debates, activity-based projects, and group discussions are integral to the Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA). Students participate in various programmes to mark important events, including poster campaigns, painting, poetry, and essay competitions. Internship training, exposure trips, and fieldwork form an essential part of the experiential learning framework within the curriculum. Sporting events are held throughout the year to promote health and fitness

awareness among students. Leadership skills are fostered through active participation in the National Service Scheme (NSS), National Cadet Corps (NCC), Young Indians (YI), Evangelical Union (EU), Red Cross, Red Ribbon Club, Students Union Patkai Christian College (SUPCC), and Patkai Graduate Students Welfare (PGSW). The Department of History organizes exposure and study tours and also maintains a heritage museum located in the library complex. The Department of Political Science provides students with firsthand exposure to governmental and non-governmental agencies to gain practical experience in policing, administration, and local governance. Dissertation writing is mandatory in the postgraduate programmes of Environmental Science, Geology, Botany, Physics, Political Science, and Zoology, as well as in the undergraduate Philosophy programme. Research Methodology is offered as a standalone course to strengthen students' research skills.

20.Distance education/online education:

Patkai Christian College continuously strives to enhance its IT infrastructure to support effective teaching, learning, administrative management, and access to information. In pursuit of its vision, the College regularly upgrades its IT facilities to meet evolving technological demands. Since 2020, the College has employed ERP software to integrate Information and Communication Technology (ICT) at all levels of interaction with stakeholders. Currently, the College is implementing e-governance across all areas of operation, including planning and development, administration, finance and accounts, student admission and support, academics, and examinations. The use of ICT-enabled teaching tools was significantly expanded during the academic sessions held amid the pandemic, ensuring the smooth delivery of online classes. Faculty members were trained in online teaching and interaction techniques, while the staff of the Examination Department acquired the technical expertise required to conduct various types of examinations online. The College also serves as an examination center for several state and national online examinations. With a robust IT infrastructure, reliable internet connectivity, and sufficient resources in place, the College is well-prepared to implement the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 requirements for Distance and Online Education. The institution's readiness is commendable, and it is only a matter of time before the NEP is fully implemented at Patkai Christian College.

Environmental Science and English Communication Skills are compulsory courses for all UG programmes. NCC is a specialised course in UG level under the guidance of the UGC. The college offers courses for employability and entrepreneurship enrichment along with Skill Enhancement courses. Internship trainings, field study projects, and exposure trips are a part of the curricula for some courses. Dissertation writing is mandatory for PG programmes of Zoology, Botany, Geology and Political Science, and in UG programme for Philosophy.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses students' learning levels and organises special programmes for both slow and advanced learners.

The College embarks on the Christian value of charity, inclusiveness and accommodative spirit to mediocre students apart from accepting academically excellent students in its admission policy. Internal written test, class presentation, debate, group discussion, MCQ examinations, and the common written examinations are conducted in a well-regulated manner. A student is effectively judged from different angles through all these exercises and remedial measures are provided on need basis some of which are: Remedial classes; Repeat and improvement examinations; Mentorship and Counselling. In addition, the advanced learners are provided with added opportunities for enhancement of their capabilities. The college offers short-term courses in computer applications, music, and counselling which are simultaneously taken up alongside their regular academic programme. To hone the writing skills of students, the college publishes bi-monthly bulletin and annual college magazine. Training in ICT usage, Free coaching for public service examinations and career counselling are also provided; and programmes for such endeavours are conducted from time to time.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student-centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences:

The CBCS offers ample opportunity to students in varied fields for praxis-oriented learning. Internship trainings and field and project works are modes of experiential learning that form an integral part of the curricula. Special lecture and exchange programmes, online quiz competitions, Science exhibitions, industrial visits for hands-on training in entrepreneurship, and on accounting and auditing, visit to newspaper offices, literary fests, and one-day career guidance/awareness programmes etc are also conducted. Class seminars/ presentations, dramas/ skits, debate, activity-based projects, group discussions etc. are conducted as part of the CIA. Programmes are conducted to mark important events where students participate in poster campaigns, painting and poetry /essay competitions. Students are empowered with leadership skills through the NSS, NCC, YI, EU, Readers Club, SUPCC, PGSW, etc. Internship for a period of minimum 1 month is a requirement in Mass Communications. The History department maintains a heritage museum in the library complex. Political Science department exposes the students to government and non-governmental agencies for a first-hand experience in policing, administration and local governance. Mandatory dissertation writing is practised in the most of the PG programmes, and in Philosophy UG programme.

Although situated in a rural setting, the college strives to update itself in IT infrastructure to enhance effective teaching learning management, change in learning approaches, and in access

to information. The use for ICT enabled teaching tools enhanced to a great extent during academic sessions. With a view to enable teachers use ICT enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process, the college has commendable IT infrastructure connected with high Internet connectivity in 27 allotted rooms which double up as ICT classrooms. Apart from the conventional lecture method, the faculty uses multiple interactive methods for teaching like group discussions, quiz, tests, assignments, debate, presentations, Viva-Voce, animation, audio and video clippings, and use of online resources to expose the students for advanced knowledge and practical learning. In addition to this, various platforms of apps are being used by the faculty members like Zoom, Google classroom and MasterSoft ERP CCMS. Faculty takes extra classes from home and also share screen, video, audio, PPT, e- book, etc.

Students are assessed for a total of 100 marks for each course; 30 marks for Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and 70 marks for End-Semester Examinations (ESE). Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) As CIA component, students wrote centrally conducted 45-minute/1-hour internal examination for 10/20 marks, assignment/oral presentation for 10 marks. For Undergraduates 10 marks Multiple-choice question (MCQ) exams were administered by the Examination Section using the MASTERSOFT ERP ITLE module. All the students are registered in the college examination portal with their designated username and password.

The students can log in to the examination portal and check their performance for each course in terms of marks and remarks/comments of the course teacher. Result Declaration Results for all undergraduate and postgraduate terminal students were declared on 6July, 2022and results for BMus was declared on 19 July 2022. Internship trainings, field study projects, and exposure trips are a part of the curricula for some courses. Dissertation writing is mandatory for PG programmes of Zoology, Botany, Geology and Political Science, and in UG programme for Philosophy.

Students are assessed for a total of 100 marks for each 5/6 credit course; the mark distribution is broadly divided into two categories: 30 marks for Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and 70 marks for End-Semester Examinations (ESE). Numerical marks are converted to grades A, B, C, and D using a ten-point scale. The students are shown evaluated scripts along with remarks/comment in the class. The internal examinations and 2/3-hour End-Semester Examinations are conducted

as per the routine set by the Controller of Examinations. Each faculty is involved in question setting and evaluation. All end-semester examination questions for each course go through a stringent process of moderation by the Question Moderation Board of each department. 3.1 - Promotion of Research and Facilities

3.1.1 - The institution's research facilities are frequently updated and there is a well-defined policy for promotion of research which is uploaded on the institutional website and implemented

In order to promote quality education through research and innovation, the College Research Committee initiated in 2011 has been carrying out activities in the areas of promotion of research, talk symposiums, research consultancy, writings and publications. Its main task is to create an ecosystem in the institution for research and innovation as well to develop strategies for the promotion of research culture among staff and students. The established Committee convene meetings of all PhD degree holders of the college and prompt them in applying research related activities through various funding agencies and to encourage collaborative research projects. It further encourages all departments to conduct at least one academic activity in a semester in the form of seminar/ conference. In 2018, the college established the Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) Cell, and signed a MOU with the Patent Information Centre (PIC), Nagaland Science and Technology Council Department of Science and Technology, Govt. of Nagaland in 2019.

Promotion of research activities among the students is encouraged through dissertation writing for students in the PG departments of Botany, Environmental Science, Geology, Political Science, Physics and Zoology, and in Philosophy UG programme under the guidance of the college faculty in the concerned area of study. Research Methodology is offered as a separate course in various departments at the Masters level for equipping the students with future research endeavours. The Research committee also publishes an annual research peer reviewed journal of the college namely Patkai Journal of Multidisciplinary Studies (PJMS).

The college has initiated steps that serve as an ecosystem for transfer of knowledge to the students in the following ways: The department of History maintains a heritage museum in the library complex with a special focus on tribal or local culture. The Music curriculum prepares the students to be entrepreneurs by way of starting their own music studios or getting employment in bigger establishments. The recordings (CDs and MP3 files) and interviews collected from projects are archived in the Music Library in the hope that Patkai will become a repository of worth for the preservation and dissemination of Naga folk music. The Indo-Myanmar Tribal Research Centre (IMTRC) houses books and materials that are of immense help to researchers. The natural landscaping and campus surroundings of sprawling jungle, natural water-bodies, streams and rivers provide essential ecosystem for field-study and research. The college has its own fisheries, horticulture, plantation (rubber and teak), timber enabling students and faculty to learn and develop praxis oriented knowledge on the biodiversity of fauna and flora. The college also offers some value added courses in addition to the practice of Assignment Writing and Project Works that are research and praxis oriented.

College offers adult education, professional development, and lifelong learning programs to provide opportunities for individuals to enhance their skills, knowledge, and career prospects. The college also conducted a training programme for unemployed women in Mushroom cultivation.

College frequently organises workshops, seminars, and conferences to disseminate knowledge, research findings, and best practices to community members and other interested individuals. Students of MSSM give individual tutoring to the children both on campus and off campus on guitar, piano, violin, voice and cello. Musical recitals are held twice a year for the students in order to inculcate the etiquettes of performance, build up confidence and overcome stage fright.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipments, etc.

The college is spread across two campuses. The total built-up area of the college has 69 classrooms, a library and 41 laboratories. Hostel facilities are provided inside the campus with 11 boys halls and 7 girls halls. All academic departments are provided with computers and continuous internet LAN facilities. The UGC Resource Centre has 48 computers with internet facilities, printing and photocopy machines for students. The college library is equipped with printing and photocopy machines and computers with internet facilities. The examination department provides computers for all the staffs with internet facilities, scanning machine and printing and photocopy machine. Each of the science departments have well-equipped laboratories with extra facilities in some departments; Mushroom and floriculture units in Botany department; Museum in Geology department; Museum and Aquarium lab in zoology department. The Mass communication department has well equipped studio with shooting and editing facilities; two editing suites, video and audio equipments, projector and studio lights, Go-pro, light reflectors, Green screen and white screen, Teleprompter et al. The Margaret Shishak School of Music has 16 practice rooms; one study room; one computer lab with internet facilities; six teacher's studios; one library; Recital hall; one recording room and one piano lab.

Patkai Christian College implemented the Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS) at the undergraduate level in 2016, in accordance with UGC mandates, and conducts syllabi reviews and updates for all programs every three years.

Teaching and Learning: Each department develops a specific academic calendar, Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course

Outcomes (COs) every semester, overseen by the Academic Dean.

Examination and Evaluation: The college employs two primary parameters for assessment: Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and End-Semester Examinations (ESE). Additionally, participation in co-curricular activities is mandatory for all students.

Research and Development: The Research Committee actively promotes research initiatives, organizing symposiums, consultancy services, and scholarly publications. In 2018, the college established an Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) cell to support research endeavors.

Library, ICT, and Physical Infrastructure: The college utilizes ERP software for effective administrative and academic interactions with stakeholders, including students, faculty, and parents. The Central Library also employs Management Information Systems (MIS) for its operations.

Human Resource Management: The college employs over 200 staff members. Faculty members participate in UGC-mandated orientation, refresher courses, and other training programs. Staff development is supported through workshops, seminars, and lectures, enhancing their knowledge, skills, and abilities.

The Institution practices centralization of financial management through a single branch of Accounts Section. Both Internal and External audit are conducted. Internal audit is usually conducted by a team appointed for a period of 3 years by the BOT, and is focused specially on budget control, assessments, process assessments, legal compliance, and the safeguarding of assets. The team's report is sent to the management, and may result in recommended changes after which the report is taken into consideration for external audit by the CA. The BOT has the authority to approve or reject the report by the concerned party.

The mechanisms financial control:

-The Institute rely solely on its Budget for Income and expenditure. All expenditure accounted under its respective head as is being registered in the ledger register and computer.

Any payment outside the budget requires the approval of the BOT.
-Payments and Receipt of goods all are under the control of the management.

-Day- to- day collection is recorded and verified daily, and deposited to the College's General Accounts on monthly basis. Payments above Rs. 50,000 are paid through cheque.

Faculty and students were given orientation on the usage and benefits of the new educational software for online class and examinations. Presently, the college has commendable ICT enabled teaching learning tools connected with high Internet connectivity.

1. Mentoring and Counselling:

The IQAC kept its goal as "Students Mentoring Activity" to be of top priority in the year 2017 - 2018, and has been following up the practice all along. Mentoring activity is undertaken by the faculty under the supervision of the head of the academic departments, and two (2) trained counsellors.

1. Review of Teaching- Learning Outcomes:

In a pandemic situation where many of the activities were conducted online, review of the teaching- learning outcome became an important aspect. The college conducted online class upto August 2021. Since 2021, monitoring of teaching-learning through OBE, Attainment of CO, PO and PSOs are the goals set by the IQAC. A case in point, Academic audit process starts with course allotment by the head of the department and the teacher prepares a teaching/lesson plan for the course.

Patkai Christian College, located in the Chümoukedima-Seithekema area in Chumoukedima District, Nagaland, is a residential institution with over 10 buildings dedicated to administrative, academic, and recreational purposes, along with canteens and a stadium. The campus also includes multiple hostels for students and residential quarters for faculty and staff.

The College operates a comprehensive solid waste management program in collaboration with the Chümoukedima Town Council. The College oversees the demarcation of areas for waste collection and segregation, while the Town Council facilitates the collection of community and household waste.

Waste is broadly categorized as degradable and non-degradable. Degradable waste, primarily consisting of food scraps, cardboard, and paper, is managed on campus, with residents repurposing food waste as livestock feed or converting it into compost. Non-degradable waste, including plastics, PET bottles, and tins, is collected by municipal services on a weekly basis.

Additionally, e-waste is responsibly disposed of through recycling with scrap dealers.

This coordinated approach ensures efficient waste management on campus, promoting environmental sustainability and responsible waste disposal.
